Protecting Herefordshire's most vulnerable Children

Local Authorities run many services, some you experience almost daily like highways, others perhaps not at all. The Council has a statutory duty to look after vulnerable children. These young people may need support or care as there is a concern for their health and wellbeing. Sometimes this means very difficult decisions to be made, including should a child be removed from its parent or family, with huge implications involved and life changing events for individuals. Many children will be placed on risk registers- sometimes before they are born.

This a very sensitive and pressured area requiring skilled staff and nationally there are real challenges in running Children's services. In Herefordshire we have circa 400 children in care, which is a high figure compared to other similar councils and there have been real concerns about the way the service has been locally run. Last year the Secretary of State following Ofsted concerns intervened and appointed Eleanor Brazil as her Commissioner to oversee the service. Despite some recent small improvement the council's children's care department was still judged not to have the capacity or capability to run the services on their own.

The Secretary of State has retained her Commissioner Eleanor Brazil to continue to oversee Children's care services in Herefordshire. In the Statutory Declaration published on the 1st March, the Minister instructs Herefordshire Council to work and cooperate with Ms Brazil and an appointed improvement adviser until further notice.

This is the right decision given the long history of poor performance and particular poor response to Ofsted reports since 2019. Having external leadership, directly responsible to the Secretary of State, is the best way that the council's children's service can stabilise and sustain improvement. Giving vulnerable children, families and carers the proper standards of process and support.

Going forward Worcestershire and Telford and the Wrekin councils will support the local services together with other national assistance. Longer term a lead local authority partner will be required. Maintaining and sustaining improvement will be a challenge and at a financial cost. The current budget for these services for 2022/23 which was 54.5 million pounds but is projected by the end of this month to have overspent and be 63.5 million.

Every child matters and most importantly we have to secure better outcomes for the most vulnerable. This must remain the Council's most important priority.

The 'Step Up' To Social Work programme in Herefordshire Council has opened for recruitment for aspiring social workers to apply for a place on the intensive but highly rewarding training programme.

Step Up To Social Work is 14-month, full-time training programme for talented graduates and career changers to become the next generation of child and family social workers supporting vulnerable children, young people and families. It is designed for people who want to become a social worker but do not have a degree in social work. Successful applicants train through a combination of academic study and hands on social work experience in a local authority.

Local government elections on 4 May 2023

The last local government elections in Herefordshire were held in 2019. Herefordshire's next scheduled elections will take place on **Thursday 4 May 2023**, where all 53 district wards and 133 parish/town councils will hold elections for new members.

Postal and proxy voting

Many voters today prefer to vote by post. If you will be away on polling day, at work or on holiday, are physically unable or just don't have the time to get to a polling station to vote in person, you can still exercise your democratic right to vote. You may have moved house since the electoral register was drawn up and have not yet joined the register at your new address. For your convenience, you now have the right to vote by post.

New arrangements allow anyone who is on the Register of Electors to apply for a postal vote at any election. However, you must be registered under Individual Electoral Registration to apply to vote by post or proxy. Remember if you can't get to your polling station for whatever reason, you can apply for a postal vote but you must be registered under Individual Electoral Registration first.

Download a postal vote application form and return it to electoral services by post or by hand.

The deadline for the receipt of new postal vote applications or to change or cancel an existing postal applications for all elections is 11 working days prior to polling day. Postal vote ballot papers are normally sent out about a week before the election.

For the first time residents in Herefordshire will need to show photographic ID to vote at this year's local elections. Residents are being urged to make sure they are ready to vote in May by checking they have an accepted form of ID.

The requirement to show photo ID at the polling station is introduced by the UK Government's Elections Act which was passed last year and

comes into effect for the first time this May. This will affect all electors who vote in person or by proxy, at the next local Council elections on Thursday 4 May 2023 Electors or their proxy must bring a suitable form of photographic ID to their polling station before they are given a ballot paper. If someone doesn't have accepted photo ID, they can apply for a free voter ID document, which is known as a Voter Authority Certificate (VAC).

The electoral commission are running a campaign which we will be supporting to remind people they need to have accepted Photo ID in place in order to vote or they will need to apply for a VAC

Council adopts the total Council Tax precepts for 2023/24

It is a matter of record that I, along with my Conservative colleagues, voted against this year's 4.99% overall charge proposal; however, we and our other opposition members were narrowly defeated by 2 votes. Similarly last year we proposed to the administration an alternative to not to impose the tax levy. We proposed that, as we then had some financial reserves, that those council tax payers in Herefordshire could have a 0% levy imposed. Thus a standstill, to offset, to some extent, the then impending cost of living crisis, again this was defeated in the vote.

The Council Tax bills will be sent out this month and at its meeting on 10th February the council approved a budget requiring the amount to be raised from Council Tax was £127 million resulting in a 4.99% increase. A band D council tax for 2023/24 will increase to \pounds 1,786.61 – an increase of £86. Added to this is the Police precept (£18.8 million is raised in Herefordshire towards West Mercia Constabulary) a band D charge of £264.50, an increase of £14.84 or 5.94%. Also the Hereford & Worcester Fire service (£6.7 million raised from

Herefordshire) a band D charge £94.40 an increase of £5 or 5.59%. Finally the Parish precept is also to be added.

Herefordshire Council on 3rd March adopted the total Council Tax precepts for all Herefordshire residents. As the billing authority, the council has a statutory duty to collect charges set by each parish council, the Police and Crime Commissioner for West Mercia and Hereford & Worcester Fire Authority. However, Herefordshire Council has no control over the level of increase or how these organisations choose to spend their budget. Herefordshire residents will be provided with individual bills based on their parish location. The raised precepts are needed to support the delivery of vital services across the county, with the average Council Tax bill for a Band D dwelling set at £1,862.50.

Cabinet Commission presents options for restoring the Wye

A progress report has been published setting out some preliminary findings and recommendations from The Cabinet Commission for Restoring the Wye.

The Commission was set up by Herefordshire Council last year to investigate options for restoring the River Wye to good health. Its membership also includes the other three councils with responsibility for parts of the River Wye catchment area - Powys, Monmouthshire and Forest of Dean.

Presently river protection is provided through the delivery of a Nutrient Management Plan (NMP) overseen by the River Wye Nutrient Management Plan Delivery Board). Following a review of these measures the conclusion reached is that the present voluntary activities <u>do</u> <u>not</u> provide the protection and actions needed to prevent further deterioration of the river's Special Area of Conservation (SAC) and <u>will not</u> deliver river restoration. More needs to be done, and the Commission makes a number of recommendations.

One of these recommendations is that other forms of regulatory and monitoring schemes for farming practices are explored, as a matter of urgency, to rule them in or out as viable solutions to deliver certainty for the river. Agriculture is assessed as contributing more than 70% of the phosphate pollution in the river catchment.

Herefordshire Council has now published its proposed Masterplan and Transport Strategy for Hereford City which include several interesting features. The funding for all of this was City masterplan £1 million, Eastern bridge crossing 400k and 62K to local transport development. However the decision to reverse the decision on the Hereford western bypass and cancel the work the southern link road (from the A49 to the A465 Abergavenny highway) cost 22.4 million pounds! So why build an eastern crossing when you threw out the Southern link road to A465.

A push towards more greener Hereford, walking, cycling and electric buses has some merit but what if you live outside Hereford City? If Hereford is to remain our County service centre how do we get there and through there? Greening over car parks, reducing highway capacity with more green space and anti-car measures ignore the reality of our lives in rural areas.

Some of the aspects have been aspirational for over 20 years like Transport Hub at Railway station, but others do challenge the wider thinking on the movement of people and business in and outside the City. There will be a fuller public consultation in the summer before submitting to Government.

Project Brave began as a new way of dealing with homelessness and rough sleeping during the recent covid pandemic, when government notified councils to bring 'everyone-in' from the streets. In addition, this multi-agency partnership set out to create solutions for very vulnerable people at risk from substance use, mental health, criminal experience and exploitation. It zeroes in on those who aren't eligible for, or fall between the cracks of, various statutory services.
