Dear Residents

I must admit that this weather is a pleasant change to the flooding we experienced through last year. However, we now require rain to make the crops and gardens to flourish.

Regarding the Hereford by-pass. There has been significant progress towards the first phase of the Hereford by-pass; this being the route from A49 south at Grafton to A465 Abergavenny Road (phase one). This start has been reached with the beginning of the procurement process of a contractor to work on the final details of the designs and then build. They should be identified by the end of the year and work beginning in latter part of 2026. As it has been stated before the £30 million project will now have to be paid for by Herefordshire residents as the previous administration returned the government funding to Westminster and sold back the previously compulsory purchased land! While there remains strong opposition to building any new road infrastructure, I continue to believe that the majority of Herefordians still support the highway schemes. However, the remaining western option will need central government support.

Herefordshire Council is one of very few local authorities who will managed to secure a closure of their 2024/25 accounts before the end of June. Despite the continuing financial challenges and increased demand, the council has shown the outturn to be an underspend of £0.5 million; small but a better situation than when we took over the administration. This achievement included successfully achieving £10.9 million of planned savings, prudent use of reserves and rigorous financial management across all areas of the council during the last fiscal year.

The local election results last month saw some significant changes to local government with all three of our adjoining English Councils experiencing a change in political administration. We will be working with our neighbours to discuss key strategic issues that affect us jointly, including understanding their position on the government's devolution agenda. It is important we share with them what's important to our county and contribute to the discussion, to ensure we secure the best outcome for Herefordshire.

Within the next few weeks central government will be announcing details of its multi-year settlement and the three years funding allocation to local authorities. We have been pleased with the management of our financial performance over the past year which has allowed us to manage the previously reported £7 million rural services grant cut without major cuts. However, this is not a sustainable position. Through the Rural Services Network the Chairman of the Council has helped by lobbying and co-ordinating evidence to support the extra costs of

providing rural services. However, unfortunately suspicions are that how can an urban focused government be favourable to rural areas - but I hope I am wrong.

Finally in my personal review, we are at the halfway point of this administration, time to reflect on what we have achieved in the two years. The administration has pulled children's service round, achieved directorates to run on budget, delivering many projects, increased spend on roads £13.5 M this financial year with £8M last year, addressing drainage and Rights of way funding and delivery of 10 new bridges installations. Herefordshire Council is continuing to invest in the county's roads, with a programme of resurfacing works taking place throughout June. Finally, to put in place a new public realm contract to better deliver the service with inhouse staff by June next year. Plus, all the things you have achieved in your ward.

Finally, I just wanted to congratulate the staff of Herefordshire Council who were recently recognised and celebrated for just some of their achievements last week. I'm really pleased and really very proud of the outstanding work of colleagues who contribute to the organisation and who want to make it better, for residents and for all of us, every day. It's fantastic that we've been able to recognise their hard work in this way. Register for New Garden Waste service from next March

As briefly reported last month, Herefordshire Council is preparing to introduce a new household garden waste collection service from March 2026 and residents are being invited to register their interest.



The new, optional, garden waste collection service will replace the current single use green plastic sacks, The fortnightly collection service will cost £60 for the year (per container) plus an additional initial £10 delivery fee.

A new bin (or sacks where bin storage is not possible) will be provided to residents who choose to subscribe, to collect lawn cuttings, hedge clippings, leaves, twigs and small branches, dead

flowers and weeds. The garden waste collected will be composted.

The new service follows the recent introduction of the collection of small electrical items and batteries for recycling and will help the council to achieve ambitious recycling targets. Residents are being asked to pre-register their interest in the service now to help inform the delivery of containers and the development of collection rounds. No payment will be taken at this stage.

The Council also intends to introduce food waste weekly collections from next March also. This will mean each household will have two caddies – a small one for your kitchen which you will empty onto a larger one to put out with your bins weekly.

P.S. Don't forget the new Waste Electrical and electronic equipment and batteries recycling collection is now available. Just leave your small electrical appliances on top of the bin – black or green, with batteries in a small bag!

Local Government Boundary Commission - Review

Herefordshire Council will be undergoing a Ward review to establish whether the current situation and numbers of councillors is appropriate and effective, for those constituents in each Ward area. This will look at our electoral arrangements: the number of councillors, the names, number and boundaries of wards and electoral divisions and the number of councillors to be elected to each. The LGBCE will look to conclude their review within the next year with any subsequent changes that may be recommended being brought into force following all out local elections in May 2027. The review will take around 18 months to complete, with the final recommendations laid in Parliament and new ward boundaries implemented for elections in May 2027.

This is different from the recent Parliamentary review. Further information will be given as and when we are notified.

Parish Council Charter

The parish councils and Herefordshire Council have been in discussion to enable a Parish Council Charter agreed to be published. There are 134 parish and town councils in Herefordshire all playing a valuable role in local democracy and service provision. The most recent quarterly Parish Summit, held in May was very well supported, and saw ongoing collaborative working between councillors and Herefordshire Council. Officers from numerous teams showcased their services in a marketplace, which was engaging, providing updates and support to councillors as needed. The charter which sets out how we aim to work together. This Charter is the result of discussions locally and across Herefordshire to confirm existing good practice and to establish some new ways of working. All parish councils are invited to the quarterly parish council summit. The ways of operating together with the Charter was a key area of discussion when last, we met; with positive feedback from Herefordshire Council, and both town and parish councils alike. From the outset of this ongoing engagement, there are several councillors in place to represent Parish councils going forward. The objective is to evidence how we may work in partnership to address key areas that will benefit residents. We cannot do this work without the essential and valued working relationships we have with Parish Councils.

Grants awarded for SEND activities

Seven Herefordshire organisations and groups have been awarded over £46k in grant funding collectively by Herefordshire Council to provide inclusive social activities for children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND).

Baton of Hope x Orange Button



In 2025 the Baton of Hope will tour the UK, with the aim of opening a national conversation about suicide, to reduce stigma and to create unity with the suicide prevention community. On 2nd October 2025 the Baton of Hope will come to Herefordshire.

We are pleased to reveal that 25 of Herefordshire's Baton of Hope baton bearers are also proud Orange Button wearers! Orange Button wearers have the confidence to talk about suicide. Wearing an Orange Button is a way of showing others in your community who are having thoughts of suicide, or are worried about somebody else, that you are comfortable to say / hear the word suicide, can listen without judgement and can inform people where to find help and support.



The Orange Button scheme is in both Worcestershire and Herefordshire. In Herefordshire, "orange badge holders" refer to individuals who have undergone mental health and suicide prevention training and wear an orange button to indicate their willingness to offer support and information to others. This "Orange Button Community Scheme" is a way to make trained individuals easily identifiable and encourage people to seek help

Highways



Following a test period the council and its public realm contractor, Balfour Beatty are continuing with the use of Mastic Asphalt to help improve the management of defects on the county's roads.

Mastic Asphalt is a fast-setting, waterproof and adhesive liquid alternative used to treat road surfaces. The rubberised material bonds to the existing surface, stopping water from entering the road surface, preventing further deterioration before new potholes can form, and resulting in a long-lasting repair.

The results show that the use of Mastic Asphalt provided a 50% increase in productivity by reducing the need for hand

tools and a cost saving of 20% compared to traditional methods.

It is a tough, durable material that helps to deliver long-term repairs, and it's easier to apply and the savings will mean that more defects will be able to be addressed, with less need for repeat visits.

- Note the fly tippers' clothes, and distinguishing features. If you can hear the fly tippers, take note of anything which was said along with the speakers' accents.
- Make a note of what they dumped, the location, weather conditions and how far away
 you were at the time.
